3 (a) The objects to be pursued by the company on its incorporation are:

1. To promote scientific, sustainable, circular and inclusive waste management systems across urban and rural areas by undertaking segregation, door-to-door collection, processing, recycling, treatment and safe disposal of all categories of municipal, biomedical, sanitary, domestic hazardous, slaughterhouse, hotel/restaurant, industrial, plastic, e-waste and hazardous waste; and to work with households, commercial establishments, hotels, hospitals and industries for source segregation, awareness, scientific processing and prevention of illegal dumping, air/water/soil pollution and environmental degradation.

2. To collaborate with municipal bodies, slaughterhouses, meat processing units and private entities for scientific management of animal waste and to promote circular economy by converting waste into by-products such as bone meal, blood meal, meat meal, tallow, manure, biogas etc., while preventing illegal dumping, burning and pollution.

3. To provide free or subsidized support to poor and marginalized patients in government/charitable hospitals

including food, accommodation, medicines, diagnostics, referral, documentation, transportation and legal intervention; to run Patient Seva Kendras, community kitchens and medical assistance services and ensure no patient is denied treatment due to poverty, lack of documents or administrative negligence; and to fight corruption, overcharging and denial of free treatment in health institutions.

4. To promote transparency, accountability and good governance and to fight corruption, custodial violence, illegal detention, extortion, abuse of power, human rights violations and denial of legal rights through RTIs, PILs, complaints, awareness campaigns and legal interventions, with special focus on marginalized communities, minorities, women, SC/ST, waste workers, butchers and victims of state violence.

5. To establish schools, learning centers, digital literacy centers, vocational training institutes, nursing colleges, paramedical skills labs and employment-linked training for all genders, with special focus on women, youth, beggars, waste workers and marginalized groups; and to provide scholarships, stipends, hostel facilities, job fairs, placement drives, entrepreneurship support and linkage to wage/self-employment.

6. To eradicate malnutrition, hunger and food insecurity by running community kitchens, food banks, hospital meal programs, nutrition campaigns and ration kit distribution; and to provide relief during disasters, pandemics, floods and emergencies through food, medical aid, clothes, hygiene kits, shelters and emergency support.

7. To undertake Animal Birth Control (ABC), anti-rabies vaccination, rescue, treatment,

adoption, community feeding, mobile veterinary services and awareness against cruelty in accordance with Indian animal welfare laws, and to generate dignified employment in the animal care ecosystem.

8. To protect women and children from domestic violence, abuse, trafficking, child labour and exploitation through awareness, rescue, rehabilitation, shelters, crisis centers, counselling, legal aid and community programs and to promote gender equality, women empowerment and leadership.

9. To propagate Buddhist teachings for ethical and peaceful living; to establish Viharas, meditation centers, Dhamma schools, hostels and Bhikkhu/Bhikkhuni training centers; and to fight caste discrimination and social injustice faced by Buddhist and Dalit-Buddhist communities.

10. To promote consumer rights awareness, guidance centers, legal support and dispute resolution; to support cooperative societies through training, compliance, governance and documentation assistance; and to collaborate with government, corporates, CSR entities, universities and international bodies on community development projects.

11. To promote ecological balance, climate resilience, renewable energy, afforestation, biodiversity conservation, water and sanitation improvements, urban sustainability.

(b) \*Matters which are necessary for furtherance of the objects specified in clause 3(a) are

1. To promote scientific, sustainable and inclusive waste management practices across urban and rural areas in India.
2. To undertake door-to-door collection, segregation, transportation, processing, recycling, treatment and safe

disposal of all categories of municipal solid waste, biomedical waste, hotel and restaurant waste, construction and demolition waste, plastic waste, e-waste, hazardous waste and any other waste generated from households, commercial establishments, institutions and industries.

3. To work specifically with households, 1- to 5-star hotels and restaurants, hospitals and healthcare facilities for segregation at source, collection and channelization of dry waste, wet waste, sanitary waste, domestic hazardous waste and biomedical waste.

4. To create awareness, train and build capacity of citizens, rag-pickers, waste workers, hotel staff, hospital staff, municipal bodies and other stakeholders on waste segregation, 3R principles (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle) and circular economy.

5. To collaborate with municipal corporations, pollution control boards, government departments, hotels, hospitals, RWAs, corporate houses under CSR and international agencies for implementation of waste management projects.

6. To promote dignified livelihood and inclusive employment opportunities for youth, women, transgender persons, differently-abled individuals and marginalized communities through skill development, job placement and entrepreneurship in the waste management and circular economy sector as well as in general sectors.

7. To organize job fairs, career melas, placement drives and employment linkage programs for skilled, semi-skilled and unskilled workers, with special emphasis on waste workers, rag-pickers, sanitation workers, women waste entrepreneurs and unemployed youth.

8. To provide vocational

training, certification and up-skilling programs in waste collection, segregation, composting, recycling, machine operation, driving, security, hospitality, retail, data entry, digital literacy and other market-relevant trades for all genders.

9. To advocate for social security, fair wages, health insurance, PPE kits and labour rights of informal waste workers and ensure their mainstreaming into formal employment.

10. To create awareness and conduct training programs for butchers, meat shop owners, poultry farmers, goat farm owners, municipal workers and the general public on hygienic waste handling, segregation at source and prevention of environmental pollution.

11. To collaborate with municipal corporations, gram panchayats, government departments, slaughterhouses, meat processing units and private entities for scientific management of animal waste, blood, bones, offal, fat, feathers, intestines and other slaughter waste.

12. To promote circular economy principles by converting slaughterhouse and meat-shop waste into valuable by-products such as bone meal, blood meal, meat meal, tallow, organic manure, biogas, etc.

13. To prevent illegal dumping of slaughter waste in open areas, drains and water bodies and to stop burning of animal waste which causes air pollution.

14. To fight against corruption in all government departments, public institutions, local bodies and public services through awareness, investigation, legal action, public interest litigation (PIL) and advocacy for transparency and accountability.

15. To specially expose, prevent and take legal action against police corruption, custodial violence, illegal detention,

extortion, fake encounters, bribe-taking by police personnel and abuse of power by law enforcement agencies.

16. To protect and promote human rights of all citizens, particularly marginalized communities, women, children, minorities, Dalits, tribals, slum dwellers, hawkers, meat-shop workers, sanitation workers and victims of state violence.

17. To file Right to Information (RTI) applications, complaints under Prevention of Corruption Act, FIRS, PILs and contempt petitions against corrupt officials and human-rights violators.

18. To provide free or highly subsidized support to poor and marginalized patients and their attendants in government and charitable hospitals, including food, accommodation, medicines, diagnostic tests, blood, documentation, referral and transportation.

19. To run "Patient Seva Kendras" (Patient Help Centres) inside or near major government hospitals for guidance, free meals, night shelters, medicine distribution and emotional counselling.

20. To ensure no poor patient is denied treatment due to lack of money, documents ?? attendant support by intervening with hospital administration, district administration and courts.

21. To fight against negligence, corruption, overcharging and denial of free treatment in government hospitals through complaints, RTIS, PILs and public exposure.

22. To help patients and attendants in obtaining Ayushman Bharat cards, MLA/MP funds, disability certificates, death certificates and all required documentation.

23. To promote humane and scientific management of street dogs and pet animals through Animal Birth Control (ABC), anti-rabies vaccination, treatment, adoption, and community

feeding programs in accordance with the Animal Birth Control Rules, 2023 and Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act, 1960.

24. To operate Animal Birth Control (ABC) centres, establish community feeding points, run mobile veterinary clinics, and provide emergency rescue and treatment services for injured/sick street dogs, cats and other companion animals.

25. To undertake mass sterilization and immunization drives, adoption melas, and awareness campaigns against animal cruelty, pet abandonment, and for responsible pet ownership.

26. To train and employ youth, women, and transgender persons as animal caregivers, feeders, veterinary assistants, and dog catchers under the ABC-ARV program, thereby generating additional dignified livelihoods.

27. To provide free and remedial education, scholarships, digital literacy, and life-skills training to children of waste-workers, rag-pickers, sanitation workers, slum dwellers, and street-dwelling families.

28. To undertake advocacy, public campaigns, dharnas, peaceful agitations, signature campaigns, padyatras, public hearings, and legal action (PILS, RTI, complaints to courts/NGT/Pollution Control Board) for enforcement of environmental laws, labour rights of waste workers, humane street-dog management, and protection of public health and environment.

29. To promote and propagate the teachings of Lord Buddha - especially the Noble Eightfold Path, Four Noble Truths, Panchsheel, and the practice of Das Parami - for moral, ethical, and peaceful living among all sections of society.

30. To undertake social welfare and humanitarian activities inspired by Buddhist principles for the upliftment of Dalit-

Buddhist traditional Buddhist, and other marginalized communities following Buddhism.

31. To establish and run Viharas, Buddha Meditation Centres, Dhamma Schools, Bhikkhu/Bhikkhuni training centres, and free residential hostels for Buddhist students and monks/nuns.

32. To train and empower Buddhist women and youth as Dhamma teachers, social workers, and community leaders.

33. To fight caste-based discrimination, untouchability, and social injustice faced by Buddhist communities through awareness, legal aid, dharnas, and peaceful movements in the light of Babasaheb Ambedkar's teachings.

34. To run community kitchens and provide free nutritious meals, safe drinking water and sanitation facilities to poor patients, attendants, butchers, waste collectors and slum dwellers.

35. To provide free medicines, diagnostics, blood units, ambulance services and documentation support to economically weaker patients.

36. To protect marginalized communities (women, SC/ST, minorities, butchers, waste collectors) from police harassment, extortion and human rights violations through legal aid, RTI and PILS.

37. Eradicating hunger, poverty and malnutrition, promoting preventive health care and sanitation including contribution to the Swachh Bharat Kosh set-up by the Central Government for the promotion of sanitation and making available safe drinking water.

38 Promoting education, including special education and employment-enhancing vocational skills especially among children, women, elderly and the differently-abled and livelihood enhancement

projects;

39. Promoting gender equality, empowering women, setting up homes and hostels for women and orphans; setting up old age homes, day care centres and such other facilities for senior citizens and measures for reducing inequalities faced by socially and economically backward groups;

40. Ensuring environmental sustainability, ecological balance, protection of flora and fauna, animal welfare, agroforestry, conservation of natural resources and maintaining quality of soil, air and water including contribution to the Clean Ganga Fund set-up by the Central Government for rejuvenation of river Ganga;

41. Protection of national heritage, art and culture including restoration of buildings and sites of historical importance and works of art; setting up public libraries; promotion and development of traditional arts and handicrafts.

42. Measures for the benefit of armed forces veterans, war widows and their dependents, Central Armed Police Forces (CAPF) and Central Para Military Forces (CPMF) veterans, and their dependents including widows.

43. Training to promote rural sports, nationally recognised sports, Paralympic sports and Olympic sports;

44. Contribution to the Prime Minister's National Relief Fund or Prime Minister's Citizen Assistance and Relief in Emergency Situations Fund (PM CARES Fund) or any other fund set up by the Central Government for socio-economic development and relief and welfare of the Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, other backward classes, minorities and women.

45. Contribution to incubators or research and development projects in the field of science, technology, engineering and

medicine, funded by the Central Government or State Government or Public Sector Undertaking or any agency of the Central/State Government.

46. Contributions to public funded Universities, Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs), National Laboratories and autonomous bodies established under Department of Atomic Energy (DAE), Department of Biotechnology (DBT), Department of Science and Technology (DST), Department of Pharmaceuticals, Ministry of Ayurveda, Yoga and Naturopathy, Unani, Siddha and Homoeopathy (AYUSH), Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology and other bodies engaged in scientific research and approved by the Central Government;

49. Disaster management, including relief, rehabilitation and reconstruction activities.

50. To achieve food security and end hunger through distribution of nutritious food, promotion of sustainable agriculture, supporting small-scale farmers, and establishing community kitchens and nutrition awareness programs.

51. To ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages by organizing free medical camps, maternal and child health programs, mental health awareness, vaccination drives, and combating communicable and non-communicable diseases.

52. To ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities by establishing schools, providing scholarships, teacher training, digital education tools, and adult literacy programs in underserved areas.

53. To achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls through campaigns against gender-based violence, women's leadership training, economic empowerment initiatives, and

promoting equal access to education and employment.

54. To ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all by constructing water purification systems, building toilets in rural areas, rainwater harvesting projects, and awareness on water conservation.

55. To ensure access to affordable, reliable, sustainable and modern energy by installing solar panels in rural households and institutions, promoting biogas plants, and conducting awareness on energy efficiency.

56. To promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth and decent work by providing vocational training, entrepreneurship development programs, fair wage campaigns, and supporting MSMEs in underdeveloped regions.

57. To build resilient infrastructure and foster innovation by supporting start-ups, promoting appropriate technology transfer, and developing rural and community infrastructure such as roads, bridges, and community centers.

58. To reduce income and social inequalities within and among communities by advocating for inclusive policies, supporting marginalized groups (SC/ST, minorities, differently-abled), and implementing affirmative action and social inclusion programs.

59. To make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable through urban afforestation, waste management projects, heritage conservation, and disaster-resilient housing initiatives.

60. To ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns by promoting recycling, reducing food and plastic waste, supporting organic farming, and educating consumers and industries on circular economy principles.

61. To take urgent action to

combat climate change and its impacts by undertaking large-scale tree plantation drives, climate education in schools, disaster risk reduction programs, and advocacy for stronger climate policies.

62. To conserve and sustainably use the oceans, seas and marine resources by organizing coastal and river clean-up drives, protecting mangroves, preventing marine pollution, and promoting sustainable fishing practices.

63. To protect, restore and promote sustainable use of terrestrial ecosystems by undertaking afforestation, wildlife conservation projects, preventing deforestation, combating desertification, and protecting biodiversity hotspots.

64. To promote peaceful and inclusive societies by conducting human rights education, legal aid camps, anti-corruption awareness, peace-building workshops, and strengthening community-level governance institutions.

65. To strengthen the means of implementation and revitalize global partnership for sustainable development by collaborating with governments, corporates, international agencies, and other NGOs, mobilizing resources, and sharing knowledge and best practices.

66. Receive grants and donations, acquire property, publish reports, organize seminars/workshops, and do all such lawful acts as are necessary or incidental to the attainment of the above objects.

67. To promote, support, guide, train, and empower members, managing committees, office-bearers, and employees of all types of co-operative societies (including but not limited to housing co-operative societies, credit co-operative societies, consumer co-operative societies, agricultural co-operative societies, farmer

producer companies/organizations, multi-state co-operative societies, labour co-operative societies, etc.) by providing affordable and professional assistance in administrative, secretarial, legal compliance, documentation, accounting, auditing, election process, recovery, redevelopment, conveyance, deemed conveyance, and registration-related services.

68. To organize, conduct or sponsor training programs, workshops, seminars, webinars, certificate courses, awareness campaigns for members and managing committee members of co-operative societies on governance, legal rights and duties, and best practices.

69. To promote awareness and education about consumer rights, responsibilities, and remedies available under the Consumer Protection Act, 2019, and other relevant laws through seminars, workshops, training programs, campaigns, and distribution of educational materials.

70. To organize public awareness campaigns, rallies, and media initiatives to inform consumers about unfair trade practices, misleading advertisements, defective products, deficient services, and exploitative business tactics.

71. To establish and operate consumer guidance centers, helplines, and counseling services to assist individuals in understanding their rights and resolving consumer disputes amicably.

72. To provide free legal aid, assistance, and representation to consumers, particularly vulnerable and marginalized groups, in filing complaints before consumer forums, commissions, or courts.

73. To offer free legal assistance to victims and families, including help filing complaints, notices of claim for lawsuits, or connecting with specialized attorneys.

Advocate for accountability through civil lawsuits or support in criminal cases.

74. To Organize regular (weekly/monthly) free legal clinics in community centers, schools, or online. Victims and families can consult pro bono lawyers on filing complaints, civil rights violations, or wrongful death claims. Partner with bar associations to recruit volunteer attorneys.

75. To provide counseling, legal aid, rehabilitation, and shelter services to women and children victims of domestic violence, family atrocities, gender-based violence, or abuse.

76. To raise awareness about women's rights, the Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005, and related laws through campaigns, workshops, and community programs.

77. To establish crisis centers, helplines, safe homes, or support groups for survivors of violence.

78. To Monitor and Maintain and Regularly inspect Buddhist caves for damage from tourism, humidity, vandalism, or natural weathering. Organize volunteer clean-ups and minor repairs in collaboration with ASI or local authorities.

79. To Organize stakeholder meetings and workshops with hotel associations, individual hotel chains, and government bodies (e.g., food safety authorities, municipal corporations, or ministries of health/environment).

80. To Sign Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) with hotels for regular surplus food donation and with government entities for permissions, tax incentives, and logistical support (e.g., refrigerated transport subsidies).

81. To Run joint campaigns with hotels and government includes Workshops, social media drives, and school programs on food waste prevention, hygiene

importance, and benefits of donation.

82. To Conduct interactive sessions in schools and communities and Use street plays (nukkad natak), posters, and discussions to highlight real stories of child labour impacts.

83. To Raise awareness about the harms of child labour and child rights violations.

84. Educate parents, communities, and children on laws protecting child rights (e.g., ILO conventions, national child labour laws) and Identify and rescue children in exploitative situations.

85. To work for Community Needs Assessment and Empowerment and to Conduct surveys to identify vulnerable families and prioritize aid and Combine relief with skill training and livelihood programs to reduce dependency.

86. To provide Food and Nutrition Support to Operate community kitchens and distribute cooked meals to vulnerable groups (e.g., homeless, daily wage workers, and hospital patients? families) and to Provide dry ration kits (including grains, pulses, oil, and spices) through food banks and drives.

87. To provide Clothing and Winter Relief and to Conduct clothing drives to collect and distribute new/used clothes, blankets, and winter wear to the needy and to Provide seasonal relief items (e.g., blankets during winters) to slum dwellers, street children, and elderly.

88. To run Hygiene and Sanitation Programs and to Distribute hygiene kits (containing soap, sanitary pads, toothpaste, toothbrushes, detergents, and menstrual hygiene products) and Promote hygiene awareness through campaigns and workshops.

89. To provide Healthcare and Medical Aid and to Run free medical camps and distribute essential medicines and Assist

beneficiaries in accessing government health schemes like Ayushman Bharat for free treatment.

90. To promote transparency, accountability, and integrity in governance at local, state, and national levels by raising public awareness about the harmful effects of corruption and illegal practices in government.

91. To collaborate with government agencies, other NGOs, media, and international organizations for joint initiatives on good governance, e-governance, and anti-corruption measures.

92. To advocate for stronger anti-corruption policies, reforms, and implementation of laws through peaceful means, including submissions to government bodies, petitions, and policy dialogues.

93. To Assist slum dwellers in forming cooperative housing societies and gathering promoter signatures for standard project approvals;

94. To Provide hands-on guidance in collecting, verifying, and submitting proofs for Annexure-II eligibility, appeals, biometric processes, and benefits

95. To Conduct workshops on rights, recent GRs, digitization, and transparency in beneficiary lists to build long-term community resilience and effective engagement with SRA and developers.

96. To apply for, bid, participate in, and undertake all kinds of government tenders, contracts, projects, schemes, and programs (including on GeM, eProcure, and other platforms) for social welfare, community development, education, health, skill development, awareness campaigns, surveys, implementation of government initiatives, and any related services, in collaboration with central, state, or local government bodies.

97. To work for the prevention, alleviation, and eradication of malnutrition in women and children through nutrition awareness programs, distribution of supplementary food, health check-ups, education on balanced diet, counseling, community interventions, and implementation of government schemes related to maternal and child health and nutrition.

98. To promote and spread awareness in all kinds of sports through organizing sports events, workshops, training programs, awareness campaigns, talent development initiatives, coaching camps, seminars, and collaboration with sports bodies for the encouragement of physical fitness, sportsmanship, and participation across all age groups and communities.

99. To identify, rescue, and rehabilitate beggars (including children, women, elderly, disabled, and transgenders) from streets, traffic signals, temples, railway stations, bus stands, and tourist places across India through regular rescue drives in collaboration with police, child welfare committees, and local bodies.

100. To establish and operate short-stay homes, night shelters, and full-fledged rehabilitation centers providing free food, clothing, medical care, bathing facilities, counseling, and psychological support to rescued beggars.

101. To provide free skill development and vocational training (tailoring, beauty parlour, mobile repairing, driving, cooking, handicrafts, security guard training, retail sales, etc.) to rehabilitated beggars so they can earn dignified livelihoods.

102. To establish and manage old-age homes, destitute women homes, and special care centers for mentally

challenged, physically disabled, and chronically ill beggars who have no family support.

103. To operate de-addiction and rehabilitation centers for beggars suffering from drug, alcohol, or substance abuse, providing medical treatment, counseling, and long-term follow-up.

104. To provide free healthcare camps, regular medical check-ups, medicines, spectacles, hearing aids, wheelchairs, crutches, and prosthetic limbs to destitute beggars and street dwellers.

105. To establish, maintain and run a full-fledged Nursing College offering GNM, B.Sc. Nursing, Post Basic B.Sc. Nursing, M.Sc. Nursing and Ph.D. in Nursing with 100% free or highly subsidized seats for girls from economically weaker sections, rural areas, SC/ST/OBC and minority communities.

106. To provide free coaching and bridge courses for underprivileged students aspiring to join nursing and paramedical courses and to conduct entrance exam preparation camps in rural and slum areas.

107. To set up skill development laboratories and simulation centers for nursing students to practice clinical procedures free of cost and to train them on modern medical equipment without charging any fees.

108. To organize free continuing nursing education (CNE) programs, workshops, seminars and conferences for practicing nurses belonging to government and charitable hospitals.

109. To award scholarships, stipends, free hostel accommodation, uniforms, books and study materials to meritorious but economically poor nursing students.

110. To conduct certificate courses in Pharmacy Assistant, Dental Assistant, Ophthalmic

Assistant, ECG Technician, Phlebotomy, and Medical Record Keeping for youth from BPL families and orphanages with full fee waiver.

111. To set up free paramedical skill labs equipped with X-ray machines, ultrasound units, ventilators, dialysis units, and laboratory instruments for hands-on training of poor students.

112. To provide free internship and on-job training programs in government and charitable hospitals for all paramedical students of the NGO

113. To work for the complete elimination or drastic reduction of air, water, soil and noise pollution caused by industries, factories, power plants, mines and other commercial units.

114. To protect the Fundamental Right to Life, clean air, pure water and healthy environment guaranteed under Article 21 of the Constitution of India (or equivalent article of your country) for residents living around polluting industries and factories.

115. To identify, document and provide medical, legal to victims and families who have suffered or died due to industrial pollution-related diseases such as cancer, asthma, silicosis, chronic bronchitis, kidney failure, skin diseases and other occupational and environmental illnesses.

116. To conduct air, water and soil quality monitoring, community health surveys, medical camps and scientific studies to establish the link between industrial emissions/effluents and deaths/illnesses in the locality.

117. To file Public Interest Litigations (PIL), complaints and petitions before the National Green Tribunal, High Courts, Supreme Court, Pollution Control Boards, National Human Rights Commission and other

authorities for closure, relocation or upgradation of polluting factories.

118. To organise peaceful protests, awareness campaigns, padayatras, human chains, toxic tours, signature campaigns, coffin protests and other non-violent direct actions against polluting industries.

119. To organize, manage and undertake free/subsidized food distribution programs for in-patients, their attendants and family members in government and private hospitals.

120. To provide daily meals (breakfast, lunch and dinner) to patients undergoing treatment in hospitals, especially those belonging to economically weaker sections.

121. To set up and run community kitchens (langar/annakshetra) inside or near hospital premises for patients? relatives and attendants.

122. To arrange and distribute nutritious food packets and cooked meals to victims of natural calamities (floods, earthquakes, cyclones, etc.) taking shelter in hospitals or relief camps.

123. To supply special diet food (diabetic, salt-free, liquid diet, pediatric diet, etc.) to hospital patients as per medical advice.
